

In Memoriam: Dr. Helyn C. Luechauer 1921-2016

In September 2016, Dr. Helyn Catherine Luechauer, 1977 President of the American Association of Women Dentists, passed away at the age of 95.

In learning of her passing, Dr. Mary Martin (1995, 2016, AAWD President) stated, "She was active in AAWD for many years. I met Helyn at my very first AAWD meeting in 1984 and told her I would like to become involved in this organization. The rest is history." Dr. Margaret Scarlett (2002, AAWD President) added, "What a great lady! I will miss her smiling face at our meetings - and her inspiration!"

In an interview with Dr. Rhona Gissen Stanley for the Chronicle in 1991, Dr. Luechauer described her path to dentistry. She originally went to college as a pre-med student; however, World War II changed her course. In 1942, she met her husband, Jarvis Luechauer, when they were both working at the Henry J. Kaiser Shipyard. After the war, they moved to Chicago for her husband to attend dental school at Loyola University.

In 1961, Dr. Luechauer applied to 12 dental schools and was denied admittance because she was "too old and not serious enough." With determination and resolve, she applied to four schools the following year. She was 45 years old when she graduated from the University of California San Francisco School of Dentistry and was one of two women in the class of 1966. She and her husband practiced together in Hollywood, California for 35 years.

Dr. Luechauer was a role model and an advocate for women in dentistry and beyond. She was an actively engaged member of AAWD throughout her career. In 1977, she was the first woman in California's history to be appointed to the California Department of Consumer Affairs' Board of Dental Examiners. She was also involved in organizations outside of dentistry that celebrated and supported the advancement of women, including the League of Women Voters and PEO. Because of her commitment to dentistry, dedication to patient care and support of women, Dr. Luechauer was presented with the Lucy Hobbs Taylor Award in 1991, AAWD's highest honor in recognition of her many contributions.



February is National Children's Dental Health Month (NCDHM). Launched in 2008, The Children's Oral Health Institute is proud the American Association of Women Dentists (AAWD) was one of the first organizations to endorse the Lessons in a Lunch Box: Healthy Teeth Essentials & Facts About SnacksTM program for children. The AAWD logo is displayed on the lunch box and represents the dedication of female dental professionals. The nonprofit organization is excited about AAWD members' continued commitment to the oral health education of children through the Lessons in a Lunch Box presentations.

AAWD members can visit www.mycohi.org for the list of the Lessons in a Lunch Box programs being presented around the country in February. Volunteers join dental school leaders, community and student dentists, hygienists and other volunteers to offer brushing and flossing instructions to captivate audiences of students in grades 1, 2 and 3. They explain the USDA Food Plate and proper food portions. Finally, information is provided about careers in dentistry. Volunteers witness unparalleled jubilance when they give children their very own Lunch Boxes, which include a toothbrush, Sparkle Fun toothpaste and Tutti-Frutti dental floss located inside of a vibrant plastic carrot case with a rinse cup that doubles as the screw-on top.

AAWD members and others in the dental community will earn a continuing education credit by going through these steps of this one hour course, Improving Oral Health Literacy: Teaching Primary School Students through the Lessons in a Lunch Box Program.

This year is the year "To Build": 2016 National Student Representative lays foundation for Student Chapter growth

Michelle L. Thomas was elected as one of the AAWD National Student Representatives for 2016. She also served as president of the University of Florida's AAWD Student Chapter.

Michelle was born in Toms River, New Jersey and grew up in Sarasota County, Florida. In May, she will earn her DMD from the University of Florida College of Dentistry and plans to pursue postgraduate education in pediatric dentistry.

In this interview, Michelle shares reflections on her experiences as a student leader.

Q. What do you feel was your most meaningful accomplishment as the 2016 AAWD National Student Representative?

Probably the most meaningful-and largest-task I took on this year was finding contact information for every AAWD Student Chapter across the country. We now know there are 24 Student Chapters and who their presidents and advisors are. Q. You've had an exciting year, what are some key leadership lessons you learned?

This year, I became even more aware of the fact that big dreams and major steps forward are possible if you utilize the strengths of your team and remain patient. I'm so thankful to have had the opportunity to work with such an incredible team of women who not only supported all of my crazy ideas and aspirations for the student side of AAWD, but helped them come to fruition.

Q. Now that you're a few months away from graduation, what advice do you have for women dental students in their first year?

Take some time to establish who your friends are and who your support system will be in dental school because this isn't something you can do alone. There is nothing more worthwhile than having a group of people who completely understand what you're going through and how hard you are working to achieve your ultimate goal of becoming a dentist.

Aside from this, find a mentor-perhaps in your AAWD Student Chapter-who is in the year above you. Having a mentor who has just experienced everything that you are about to embark on can prove invaluable.

Finally, despite all the work and stress, make time to do something other than study. Know that dental school truly is what you make it and that the opportunities available to you as a dental student are wide-ranging. In the wise words of Disney Pixar, "Adventure is out there!"

April is Oral, Head and Neck Cancer Awareness Month

- More than 60% of oral and pharyngeal cancers are at an advanced stage (i.e., stage III and IV) at the time they are diagnosed.
- Overall, patients with oral cancer detected in the early stages have improved survival.
- Patients with early stage cancers generally require less aggressive treatment and therefore experience fewer complications.
- The curricula of training programs for oral health care providers mandate that dentists and dental hygienists be able to competently perform screening and risk assessment for oral cavity and oropharyngeal cancers

Oral health care providers are encouraged to:

- 1. Perform a risk assessment for oral diseases for all patients, including an assessment for oral and oropharyngeal cancers.
- 2. Perform a noninvasive visual and tactile oral mucosal examination as part of the standard initial and recall examination for all patients.
- 3. Educate patients about the risk factors, provide counseling and offer treatment for avoidable risky behaviors, and promote a healthy lifestyle.
